Lyric Voices from New Spain: Versions, Inversions, Repercussions

Scholars once examined the poetic voice as a predominantly masculine, Euro-descendant construction that poorly reflected the early modern Hispanic world's plurivocality. Today, a growing research corpus responds by considering how 16th- and 17th-century lyric articulates diverse identities. In conversation with such trends, this address approaches New Spanish festive texts as a phonographic archive that records the region's rich, multicultural soundscape. While elite writers' perspectives inarguably stand out in the poetry they produced for lavish celebrations, attending to the piece's performance context highlights the co-authorial voices of women and people of color who inspired verses or brought them to life on stage.
